### Gigha Hotel & Bar

Recruitment is ongoing for a management team to take on the running of the hotel with view to having the hotel fully operational by 2026. There are still lots of works on-going so please bear with us while we continue to create a welcoming hotel once again.



### Gigha Church in the Parish of Mid Kintyre and Gigha

Work begins on repairs to the Church on 9th June, though as I write the scaffolding is already going up and the Church is now a building site. Provision has been made for us to use the Church at the Sound of Gigha, on Saturday 7th June for a singing workshop and Sunday 8th for a Songs of Praise service. The work is due to take about 12 weeks but we will be able to use the Church or worship on the Sundays we are due to have a service. Otherwise, the Church is a BUILDING SITE and inaccessible to the general public. This first phase will be mainly on the roof and repointing of the walls. Fundraising for the second phase is ongoing. To that end we will have a sales table at the Sound of Gigha Makers Market. We will be happy to sell anything (legal!) at the table. Donations gratefully received!

We have enjoyed having the Furbochs at the Church but they will be moving on soon. First to the Sound of Gigha festival and then on to pastures new.

## Achamore Gardens

Hard to believe, but it's been just 4 months since Storm Eowyn visited our wee island. Since then, the gardens team, along with our brilliant volunteers and tree surgeons, have worked their socks off clearing up and reopening as much of the garden as we can, and I hope you will agree that they've done a brilliant job. Most recently we've managed to get the beautiful Springbank path reopened – it was closed due to a massive conifer that had toppled from the top of the ridge line, sadly crushing several important plants as it fell, before coming to rest fully across the path, and it was a bit of a head-scratcher to work out how to safely remove the tree without it slipping further down the hillside and causing yet more damage. Thankfully our tree surgeons came up with a plan and executed it perfectly, despite this head gardener's initial scepticism! We've still got a lot of work to do clearing up at the Summerhouse, so this area remains closed for now, but I hope to be able to give you better news on that front in the next newsletter.



Achamore is lucky to have access to our trio of tree experts, Euan, Jonny and Adam, and we've had a huge amount of advice, support and downright hard graft from all three, along with all the specialist equipment and machinery they've brought to the garden since the storm. None of that come cheap, but thanks to the incredible support we've had from around the world we've managed to raise over £20,000 already, which has covered the bill for most of the work we needed to get the garden safe to reopen. Literally every penny counts, and we are so grateful to all of our donors, from the child who gave up their week's pocket money, to the Hurtigruten Foundation who gave us a 1,000 Euro grant, and the anonymous donor who, incredibly, gave us £10,000 to kickstart the fundraiser. However, there's still a huge amount of work to do, from path repairs to tackling the swathes of damage in the shelter belts; these areas are so vital in protecting the garden, but there's several hundred trees in the shelter belts which have fallen or been severely damaged, all of which need to be made safe, and of course, new trees purchased and planted to replace them to ensure the shelter belts continue to keep the garden safe. Much of the clearing work will need to be carried out by our tree surgeons, and we also have to hire in the machinery we need to move and process the many tons of timber that are stacked around the gardens so that we can make use of this important resource, rather than letting it go to waste.

All of which means we need to raise more money, a lot more money. Now that the immediate crisis and clean up are over, we're actively hunting for funders and grants which we can apply to, but we're also going to have to raise a lot of it ourselves through direct fundraising. The whole team are beavering away coming up with ways to raise the money, but we can't do it alone. We know how much your garden means to you, and we know that Gighans never back down from a fundraising challenge, so now we are asking for your help.




## Isle of Gigha Ranger Service

What a May we have had! It has been beautiful and always seems to be one of the best months for wildlife, which has made our summer surveys an absolute joy. This year we have started weekly Shorewatches. An initiative by Whale and Dolphin Conservation to conduct 20 watches a month to spot cetaceans, and also monitor wider ocean-based activity from feeding birds, pinnipeds (seals), and vessel movement. Up to now we haven't been lucky enough to spot any whales or dolphins on the official watch, but we have had sightings of both dolphins and minke whales at the north end of the island. Let us know if you would like to join us on a Shorewatch, it's a lovely way to spend an hour, especially in the sunshine!



Our weekly butterfly transects have also started up again, and this month the island is FULL of small heath and green-veined white butterflies, and we even spotted our first painted lady! We expect the abundances of different species to differ month to month, as the summer progresses we will expect to see less small heaths or orange tips, and we are likely to see more meadow browns and red admirals.



The conservation volunteers have had a pretty long hiatus, but we were back with a bang starting up our monthly Bioblitz in Achamore Gardens. We managed to spot so many pond creatures including dragonfly nymph, mayfly larvae, midge larvae, caddis fly larvae, toad tadpoles, damselfly nymph, and even a diving beetle larvae trying to eat a poor tadpole!

We haven't seen many toad tadpoles in the pond at Achamore Gardens, and we are wondering whether this is because there are so many successful predators that we always record on surveys such as beetle larvae and dragonfly nymphs which are ruthless! We also spotted some wonderful birds including willow warbler, blackcap, chiffchaff, barn swallow, siskin and song thrush. There has also been a number of owl sightings across the island lately, please get in touch if you see an owl, we would love to know what you're spotting!

## Isle of Gigha Ranger Service continued

Our summer focus this year will be to create as many bird and bat nest boxes as possible. The loss of so many trees across the island during the storms has meant that many species have lost their preferred habitat found in mature trees, so we are aiming to mitigate this with a few boxes here and there to help. It seems an unusual time of year to be making boxes, as National Nest Box Week falls in February, but there are many arguments to say that a box that is in situ longer may be more successful as birds are getting used to the new furniture. This is also the case for bats that are currently frantically feeding, fattening up to mate in autumn when they will hibernate over the winter. They will use these boxes for a safe and stable place to roost, raise their young, and hibernate!



## Gigha Primary School & ELC

We started the month with the Gigha Primary School and ELC Summer Fair and Pet Show held at the school. The afternoon was very well attended and in total we raised £1038.30. Thank you to everyone who attended, donated raffle prizes and baking and who helped us to raise so much money. This will be used to help our pupils access their annual swimming lessons at Campbeltown Aqualibrium which start in June.

This month we have been enjoying the beautiful weather and have been completing many of our lessons outdoors and at the beach. Pupils have begun their new topics of World War Two and have been finding out about the lives of Evacuees during the time period. They have also discovered rationing and have been creatively thinking of meals which could be made. Older pupils have been reading the story 'Goodnight Mr Tom' and have been keen to find out what happens next when we finish each chapter.




We have also been finding out about the religion of Judaism and recently went on a visit to The Scottish Jewish Heritage Centre and Synagogue in Glasgow. We found out lots about the synagogue and how Jewish food practices differ to our own. Pupils asked lots of interesting questions and were able to link new information with their current understanding.



In the ELC after finding a Bee in the Nursery Garden, pupils have been learning about the life cycle of bees and their importance in our environment. We discovered some delicious honeycomb too! Pupils have now moved on to learning about magnetic objects and have been using magnets to test items around them.
